Chief & Council ElectionsTimeline Update



A new timeline has been determined for Chief & Council Elections. The elections were initially delayed due to the COVID-19 vaccination rollout. We can now proceed safely, with a COVID-19 safety plan in place.

Key dates for the elections timeline are as follows:

- In-person Nomination Meeting | May 19, 2021
- o In-person Advance Poll | June 16, 2021
- Deadline to Vote by Mail | June 19, 2021
- Election Day | June 25, 2021

This year we will be following the First Nations Elections Act (FNEA). More information will be shared in the coming weeks about the FNEA and some of the changes it will bring.

Look out for mail coming at the end of April from our Elections Officer where more details about the nomination meeting will be shared. In that package, there will be information on how to nominate and vote by mail, to limit in person contact due to COVID-19.

LNG 101 Community Survey Treaty, Land, & Resources

The Treaty, Lands and Resources (TLR) Department invites TWN community members to participate in an LNG 101 Community Survey.

Liquified Natural Gas (LNG) is a natural gas that is converted to a clear, colorless, and odorless liquid to make it easier to transport. LNG has many uses including heating, cooking, and electricity generation. There are currently LNG projects (liquefaction and export) being proposed in the TWN Consultation Area. LNG is a well-debated topic with a variety of impacts and benefits. TLR has created this survey to help inform our work and to support Chief and Council decision making.

This survey should take you 4-7 minutes to complete with an optional 30 minute LNG 101 Presentation. At the end of the survey, you will have the opportunity to enter your name into a draw to win a \$50, \$100 or \$150 EverythingCard. The survey is anonymous -- we will not connect your contact information with your survey answers.

Indigenous food for generations

On Vancouver's North Shore, the gravel crunches as Chief of the Tsleil-Waututh First Nation Leah George-Wilson walks along the beach.

For thousands of years, she said herring was an important food for the Tsleil-Waututh people. She recalls her grandparents talking about eating wild herring taken from nearby waters. For her generation though, herring is mostly something left in oral history and traditional knowledge since they were largely fished out in nearby waters.

"You only have to look up the West Coast of British Columbia to see where herring still is and to see how Indigenous people harvest there," George-Wilson told CBC News. "We did similar things and it was an important food source."

The Tsleil-Waututh and other Indigenous groups are working to bring back the fish. And they're partnering with scientists to better understand how herring live and spawn.

Movement Monday!Home Workout Series




Are you ready to workout at home and kick start into Spring?



Climate & Equity Group City of Vancouver opportunity



The City of Vancouver is seeking Indigenous members for new Climate & Equity Working Group to advise City Staff on climate-related policies, programs, and engagement efforts from an equity perspective. The group will also help to shape the development of a Climate Justice Charter that will integrate and advance equity in climate policy.

Working Group members will be expected to attend 10 meetings per year, roughly monthly (2-3 hours each), and spend approximately two hours per month outside of meetings on Working Group activity. Members will serve for 18 month terms.

We are seeking people with lived experience of systemic inequities and those who work with organizations working in this space with an understanding of and passion for any of the following: racial justice, climate justice, experience with equity indicators, and related perspectives.

A variety of experience and types of knowledge are valued and welcome. Compensation for participation at living wage rate is available.

Three seats on the Working Group are being held for Indigenous members and applications for those seats will remain open until April 30 (or later as needed until filled).

•\$5,000 scholarships allocated to students pursuing an undergraduate or graduate degree with a full-time course load.
