Tsleil-Waututh Nation hereby gives notice that an application has been made to the Minister of Transport, pursuant to the *Canadian Navigable Waters Act* for approval of the work described herein and its site and plans.

Pursuant to paragraph 7(2) of the said Act, Tsleil-Waututh Nation has deposited with the Minister of Transport, on the on-line Common Project Search Registry (<u>https://cps.canada.ca/</u>) and under registry number 12788 or, under the NPP File Number 2002-500407, a description of the following work, its site and plans:

The proposed Tsleil-Waututh Nation shoreline restoration and adaptation project involves the design and construction of nature-based shoreline erosion and flood protection and stabilization measures in combination with Indigenous marine stewardship and habitat restoration. Clean sand and gravel (beach nourishment) will be placed in the upper intertidal area of the shoreline bordering the TWN reserve. Rock headlands will be used to stabilize the new slope. Upland and salt marsh planting will provide enhanced habitats for foreshore species.

Works will be done at the shoreline of Burrard Inlet along the southern boundary of the Tsleil-Waututh Nation reserve (IR#3) with Burrard Inlet. The project includes the foreshore from the western boundary of the reserve up to the mouth of Thomas Creek.
